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Braves Meet Pirates In 'Crucial' 2 Games

The Milwaukee Braves' brawny sluggers are at it again—just in time to test the thin little band of pitchers who still have the Pittsburgh Pirates hoping for a miracle.

The Braves, who made the long ball their trade mark en route to the world championship last season, went on their greatest slugging binge of the campaign Sunday when they walloped the Philadelphia Phillies, 8-7 and 14-3, with a 33-hit barrage that totaled 59 bases. The Braves "warmed up" with 14 hits in the opener and then smashed 19, including seven doubles, three triples and two homers by Del Crandall in the nightcap.

The Pirates, meanwhile, made it 13 victories in their last 15 games at home with 3-2 and 4-3 decisions over the Cincinnati Reds. The San Francisco Giants, who routed the Los Angeles Dodgers, 12-8, are 6½ games behind the Braves and the Pirates are seven behind in third place.

The Pirates have their second chance in a week to bring the Braves back to the field Monday night and Tuesday night when they play the world champions in spacious Forbes Field where long balls often are merely long outs. The two-game series is probably the biggest Pittsburgh has had since the Pirates were battling for a pennant in 1938.

The St. Louis Cardinals profited from five errors to score a 6-2 victory after the Chicago Cubs won their opener, 9-4, in other N. L. action.

In the American League, the New York Yankees beat the Boston Red Sox, 7-5, and then bowed, 9-3, but retained their 15½ game lead as the other six teams split doubleheaders. Kansas City beat Cleveland 2-0, after an 11-2 loss; Baltimore downed Washington, 6-1; after a 6-2 defeat; and Detroit edged out Chicago, 4-3, in 12 innings after a 5-2 setback.

ENDS BITTER DUEL

Extra-Hole Birdie Gives Smith Crown

The first birdie made by Norm Smith of Greeley on the Lakewood Country Club's first hole during the Colorado State Amateur Golf Tournament brought him the title Sunday.

The 33-year-old Weld County insurance agent knocked in a seven-foot putt on the sloping green to get his birdie and defeat Les Fowler of Boulder 1 up on 37 holes for the championship.

It was an exciting windup to the bitterly waged title match over Lakewood's hilly, 6,711-yard course.

Smith, who was a member of the Colorado University golf team with Fowler in 1947 and '48, appeared to be on his way to an easy victory as deadly putting helped him forge a 5-up lead after Sunday morning's 18-hole round.

But Fowler, also an insurance agent, cheered his followers in the gallery of approximately 600 fans with a torrid comeback that squared the match on the 35th hole.

It was all even when Smith conceded the hole after missing the green and giving the 34-year-old Fowler a short putt.

They halved the 36th, then Fowler ran into trouble. On the 271-yard first hole his tee shot landed in fringe grass short of the green on the left of the fairway. Smith was short in the fairway and chipped to within seven feet.

Fowler scuffed his second shot and left himself a 10-foot putt. His bid for a birdie failed when the ball rolled inches past the cup. Smith canned his shot to end it.

The victory was the first "big one" for Smith over Fowler, although they have faced each other before in lesser matches. The Colorado title also is the first major one for the former World War II and Korea fighter bomber pilot.

"It was just one of those days," Smith said as he explained his letdown after his big lead melted Sunday afternoon.
