Youngsters Shine in State Golf Test

A strong corps of youngsters, paced by medalist Gary Polumbus, promises to give this area's veteran amateurs all the golf they want as the Colorado State Match tournament entered first round action Tuesday.

Polumbus, a 20-year-old Colo-

rado University student, toured his own course in four-under-par Monday, carding a fine 68 at Cherry Hills Country Club.

His mark was just one shy of a pair of old timers, Gene Zuspann and Claude Wright—also from Cherry Hills—and that of Ron Moore, the runner-

up to city champion Jim English earlier this year.

English, the 1960 state champion, will not defend his crown this year. He injured his left hand in a practice round and his doctor will not permit him to play.

OTHER YOUNG STARS

Other youngsters lowering or matching par in Monday's qualifying were Chip Barry of Columbine Country Club with a 71, and Larry McAtee of Lakewood CC 72.

Bob Douman, the state junior champion from Pinehurst CC, had a 74, while Mike Mielenz, a freshman-to-be at CU next fall and The Denver Post's Munylinks medalist, had a 73.

John Stevens, Wichita University student who won the Pikes Peak Invitational over the weekend, also came in with a 72 Monday.

Veteran munylinks player Gene Retzer lowered par with a 71 as did Ralph Haddad, Dr. Sam Valuck, a tough match play competitor from City Park, had a 72 as did Jim Flood and Ron Chase.

Les Lane, D-C Trucker basketball coach, qualified with a 75.

The tournament continues match play through Saturday's 36-hole semifinals and Sunday's 36-hole championship pairing.

Tired golf champ has something to smile about.

Valuck Wins State Amateur In Tense Duel

Dr. Sam Valuck rapped in a short, 18-inch putt on the sixth extra hole of his duel with Les Fowler Sunday to win his first Colorado State match play championship.

This would be enough to satisfy anyone but a golf fan. But the true story of Dr. Valuck's victory Sunday on the 42nd hole at Cherry Hills Country Club is almost too good to be true.

The sequence of events that gave the City Park Golf veteran his first major amateur title in this region, will go down as one of the most dramatic in the state tournament's 50-year history.

Fowler Favorite

Fowler, who lost in the only other modern-day extra hole final pairing in this tournament, ruled the favorite, but half of the nearly 1,000 fans that swelled the gallery, were pulling for Valuck.

Here is a brief summary of the final sequence of events:

Fowler, a Boulder insurance man and golf coach at Colorado University, pulled even on the 28th hole when Valuck three-putted.

Valuck then scrambled for four straight pars to halve Fowler by one-pulling the 30th, 31st, 32nd and 33rd holes.

On the 34th, Fowler hit a trap and took a bogey five and Valuck's par put him one up.

On the 35th, however, Fowler took a routine par five while Valuck took a bogey six after his third shot hit a rock bordering the lake and bounced back into the fringe of the green instead of going into the water. And the match went even again.

On the 36th, both took par fours, but in spectacular fashion. Valuck's second shot nearly rolled into the clubhouse patio. (Continued on Page 40)

Yankees' M-Squad 15

Roger Maris and Mickey Mantle each has 45 homers in the race to top Babe Ruth's 1927 record of 60 and the New York Yankees lead Detroit by 3½ games in the American League race.

Maris and Mantle now are 15 games ahead of Ruth's pace. He hit his 45th in game No. 132 (including one tie) and they have 45 in 117 games (also including one tie).

Although Maris and Mantle each homered in the first game at Washington Sunday it didn't mean a thing. The Senators handed the Yanks a 12-2 beating on Benny Daniels' five-hitter. Maris came through again in the second game, won by the Yanks' Jim Coates 9-4. Despite the split, New York stretched its American League lead over the Detroit Tigers who absorbed a 13-5 battering at the hands of the Minnesota Twins. Bill Tuttle hit a grand slam homer and drove in six runs for the Twins.

Trouble With Capital 'T' Keynotes State Golf Wrapup

Dr. Sam Valuck of Denver, state amateur champion, and runnerup Les Fowler, had their share of problems Sunday in the record 42-hole finale at Cherry Hills Country Club. On the 35th hole of tournament, Valuck (No. 1) shoots a

recovery shot to green after third shot hit a rock next to lake and bounced towards the hole instead of in the water. On 36th hole (No. 2) Valuck's second shot went within two feet of a patio stanchion near club house and

'Bandit' Robs Aurora Of Legion Clincher

PUEBLO—Park East Aurora's hopes of wrapping up the Class A state American Legion baseball title fell victim to a Denver bandit who pitched the Aurora nine blind Sunday at Raynor Field.

Left-hander Bill Hennigar, nicknamed "The Bandit" by his Acme Delivery Service teammates, closed the door on Aurora's immediate title hopes with a three-hit shutout in the six innings he worked Sunday. Acme ace Ken Bacon came on in the seventh to protect the shutout as Denver posted a clutch 8-6 win.

Aurora defeated Acme 11-6 Saturday night and needed only to win Sunday to grab the state title. The decider, originally scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Sunday, was put over to 1 p.m. Monday at Raynor Field here.

The winner of Monday's game will advance to the regional playoffs at Sheridan, Wyo., August 16-20.

TWIN HILL PROHIBITED

A Legion baseball rule states that a team is not required to play more than two games in a day. Acme defeated Pueblo Post 203 Sunday morning 5-2 prior to the shutout win over Aurora.

But in the sixth, Acme collected five walks and two hits for six runs, scoring the half dozen with two outs.

Leftfielder Ron Tracy opened the inning with his second hit of the day, a single to center. Tracy was forced at second by a grounder to third by right-fielder Ed Masul. Broncos Purchase Jack Hill As List of Injuries Mounts

The Denver Broncos, smarting under Saturday night's 21-13 American Football League exhibition loss to the Dallas Texans, and a lengthy injury list, had one item to cheer about Monday.

Halfback Jack Hill, formerly of Utah State and briefly of Regina in the Canadian League, has been purchased and is on his way to join the squad at the Golden, Colo., training camp.

General Manager Dean Griffling of the Broncos has been after Hill ever since he's been the Denver major draw. When flanker Al Carmichael was hurt last year, the Broncos tried to acquire Hill, but were turned down.

The Broncos brought defensive back Wes Gideon to camp from the Midland trip. A former Montreal quarterback, Gideon will be used in the defensive halfback corps.

Hill is 26, 6-1 and 185. He's an experienced all-round halfback who specializes in pass receiving, field goals and extra points. In 1958 at Regina he scored 133 points, but only 12 were scored on scrimmaging runs.

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Sunday it was determined that Bronco halfback Hal Williams did not suffer a fractured back as first reported. He was hurt and removed to the Midland, Tex., Memorial hospital during the third quarter of Saturday night's game. His injury is believed to be a sprain.

On Saturday night's game at Spokane, Wash.

Although he played most of the game, Bronco end Leland Taylor came up with a sprained ankle early in the going with the Texans. He will take it easy this week and likewise, is a doubtful starter against Oakland.

Defensive back Dan Smith was knocked down and suffered a twisted knee; tackle Carl Lanier hurt his leg, and fullback Fred Balkati came out of the first pre-season game with a leg injury. Smith will be off-limits for about 10 days.
