English Fires Par 70 For Medalist Honors

Jim English, itchy to regain the golf status he enjoyed in the area two years ago, won the Colorado State match play medal honors Monday as he fired a par 34-36-70 over the Hiwan Golf Club course.

English had been hampered the past two years by a growth on his left hand that took much of the authority out of his game.

But just a week ago English, from the Columbine Country Club, set the stage for his "return" by winning the tough Broadmoor Golf Club Invitation.

As good as English's round was Monday, it wasn't as fine as the unofficial 33-35-68 fired by defending champion Larry McAtee, 20-year-old University of Colorado student from Lakewood. McAtee who didn't have to qualify, set a course record for amateurs, breaking the 70 fired earlier this year by Ron Moore and tied Monday by English.

Moore, and Hale Irwin and Les Fowler of Boulder all had 73s behind English Monday as 52 entrants all made the Colorado Golf Association match play tournament's championship flight, including English's 16-year-old son Jimmy Jr., who fired an 83.

Earlier rains and intermittent sprinkling Monday made playing conditions at Hiwan excellent and the CGA ruling that improved lies could be taken in

the fairway was a further aid to good scoring.

With the limited field, 12 players drew first round byes as match play began Tuesday.

McAtee's record surge began on the sixth where he scored the first of three straight birdies. A bogey five on the ninth and tenth holes cost him but he birdied the 12th and 15th, lost another stroke with a bogey on the 16th and eased home two under.

English birdied the first and fifth but bogeyed the eighth for his out-going 34. A bogey on the 12th broke what would have been a string of 10 straight pars and he was in with a 36.

Irwin, the state's two-time medal play champion and a sophomore candidate for the CU quarterback job this fall, was one under par for 14 holes but could get only one par the next four holes and took a double bogey on the 16th.

Harry Gurley had a 77 to edge Carl Johnson and Red Nelson by a single stroke in the senior flight qualifying.

Match play continues through Sunday when the finalists will play a 36-hole duel for the title.

back to chasing the National League pennant. Widely circulated reports that Dark was about to get the ax were squelched Thursday by Giants owner Horace Stoneham. Said Stoneham in a statement: "I want to take this opportunity to deny all reports that a managerial change is contemplated."

That appeared to wipe out the uncertainty of Dark's future that was intensified by the appearance of a column in Newsday, a Long Island daily.

The columnist, Stan Isaacs, quoted Dark as saying Negro and Latin American players are

Dark called a special press conference before San Francisco's game Tuesday night in New York to deny making these statements plus others attributed to him by Isaacs. The conference followed a meeting with Commissioner of baseball Ford Frick, whom Dark said urged him to clear up any misunderstandings regarding his feelings

about the players. Dark would be dismissed, possibly before the team returned home Aug. 14.

The Giants official said the dismissal had nothing to do with the Isaacs column or Dark's reply, but rather was the result of long-standing disagreements between Dark and Stoneham over operation of the team, Reichler reported.

Dark called Stoneham's statement "heart-warming" and "above and beyond his duty."

"I really appreciate him doing this . . . he shouldn't have to step in every time a manager is misquoted," said Dark.

McAtee Faces Toughest Test In Colorado Quarterfinals

Larry McAtee would like nothing better than to cut a carbon copy of last year's windup to the Colorado Golf Association's match play championship tournament.

McAtee, 20-year-old defending champion from the Lakewood Country Club, moved into Friday's action with a 4 and 3 decision over Gary Polumbus Thursday and was to play his toughest foe thus far in the tournament, drawing Ron Moore in the quarterfinals.

Moore, who plays out of the Hiwan Golf Club, site of this year's tournament, was a semifinalist in the tough Trans-Mississippi championship last month. He downed H. B. (Buzz) Bolas of the Columbine Country Club 5 and 4 Thursday.

McAtee, who defeated Bob Douma of Colorado State University in last year's finale at the Valley Country Club, would eliminate his most seri-

ous threat to a repeat title if he gets past Moore Friday.

Medalist Jim English, also of Columbine, heads the bottom bracket which is dominated by area veterans. English took out young Chris Scena of Denver 4 and 3 Thursday and was to play Tad Polumbus, another University of Colorado student Friday. Tad, brother of Gary, ousted John Hamer, also of CU, 2 and 1.

Paired in the other quarterfinal in the bottom bracket were Bernard Woody and CU Golf Coach Les Fowler. Woody needed a series of long putts in downing Bud Brueggeman 1-up in Thursday's closest match and Fowler topped Bill Stevens 3 and 2.

Hale Irwin, who earlier this year gave the youth corps added status when he repeated as state medal play champion, downed Dr. Jerry Lemon 6 and 5.

He will tangle Friday with

Glen Baxstrom, former Denver Post Munylinks champion and University of Denver varsity golfer. Baxstrom downed Roger Dougherty of Valley 3 and 2.

McAtee, Irwin and Tad Polumbus, all from CU, represent the recent takeover of state amateur prestige by the youngsters. Moore, English, Fowler, Baxstrom and Woody are the veterans who hope to stem that tide.

In the senior flight quarterfinals Thursday, Harry Gurley set the pace by defeating Joe Meehan 4 and 3. He will play Carl Johnson who took out Russ Olson 1-up on the 20th. Red Nelson, winner over L. Llewellyn 5 and 4, meets A. D. Kirkland, who defeated Stan Nachazel 1-up on the 19th.

The Saturday semifinals and Sunday's finals will be played over 36 holes in championship play with the senior title scheduled for 18 Saturday.

locked them out of first place, this late in the campaign? The driving Baltimore Orioles turned the back over the weekend. They beat the mighty Yankees three times in four tries in Yankee Stadium, knocked them down to third place and took over the top spot themselves.

The Orioles won Friday and Saturday, then hit the Sunday twin bill, taking the second game 4-2 after the Yankees had squeaked through to their lone triumph 2-1. The largest baseball crowd of the year, 58,162, saw the hit which left the Orioles two games in

front of the defending champions.

"This has to be the club's biggest moment," said Baltimore Manager Hank Bauer. "Of course, we want to win them all, but I'm satisfied with three out of four from them any time . . . especially in their backyard."

A three-run explosion at the expense of Stan Williams in the third inning decided the second game. Boog Powell climaxed it with a two-run homer, his 29th of the season.

Yankee Manager Yogi Berra, although still confident his team can win the pennant,

acknowledged the Orioles are going to be tough the rest of the way.

"They have strong pitching and a good solid team," he said. "They sure battle you, don't they?"

Meanwhile, the second-place Chicago White Sox divided a double-header with the Red Sox, losing the opener 6-3 and copping the second game 4-1. The Detroit Tigers ran their longest winning streak of the campaign to seven with a 4-2, 5-2 sweep of Kansas City but Cleveland's victory string ended at five

when Minnesota beat the Indians 3-1 after a 7-0 first-game loss.

Washington rallied for five runs in the ninth inning and edged the Los Angeles Angels 6-5 in the league's only single game.

Philadelphia held its 2½ game National League lead, blanking the New York Mets 6-0 while second-place San Francisco was outscoring Cincinnati 7-5 as Willie Mays got four hits. Pittsburgh downed the Chicago Cubs 2-0; St. Louis trimmed Houston 8-2 and Milwaukee beat the Los Angeles Dodgers 6-2.

McAtee Defeats His Coach on 37th

EVERGREEN, Colo.—It was one of those things that happen on a golf course — pressure struck veteran Les Fowler and never touched collegian Larry McAtee at the Hiwan Golf Club Sunday afternoon.

The disastrous turn of events gave McAtee a 1-up victory on 37 holes and his second successive Men's State Amateur Match Play championship. By three-putting the 36th and 37th holes, Fowler — McAtee's golf coach at the University of Colorado — deprived himself of his second title.

Fowler, 40, twice came from behind in the evenly played match over the hilly par 70, 7-112-yard layout and had victory on the blade of his putter when he reached the 36th green.

He had won the 35th with a par four when the 21-year-old McAtee bogeyed as he blew a two-foot putt, giving Fowler a 1-up advantage.

Fowler's second shot to the rolling green on the 430-yard 36th was 50 feet to the side, while McAtee placed his second in the fringe 30 feet behind the pin. Fowler lagged 10 feet short, McAtee two feet.

The payoff putt by Fowler didn't pan out as the ball nicked the side of the cup and stopped 12 inches away.

"I'll give five dollars to anyone who wants to use this putter," McAtee quipped to the gallery as he lined up his match-saving tap. He drilled it into the cup to force an extra hole.

The end came quickly for Fowler on the 37th. His second putt—a five footer—rolled away from the side of the cup. McAtee's 15-foot downhill tap went three feet past the hole, but he dropped his next shot for his par and the championship.

"It was the most even match I ever saw," tourney referee

Rodg Dougherty said. "I had to measure six times on the greens and even once on the fairway. That's how close they were hitting them."

Fowler toured the course in a one-under par 69 in the morning to McAtee's 73 and when he won four straight holes—the 14th, 15th, 16th and 17th—to go 4-up, McAtee apparently didn't have a chance.

But in the afternoon round, McAtee perked up, taking the 19th and 25th when Fowler lost his putting touch.

By repeating as champion, McAtee joined two other two-time winners—Jim Vickers (1949-50) and Jim English (1957-60) — to head the list of winners in the tourney that has been played 62 times.

Fowler won in '54, then was runnerup in '59, '61 and '64.

Winter Rules To Be Allowed In State Golf

Tournament Chairman George Janzen announced Saturday night "winter rules" will prevail in the Colorado Golf Association's state match play golf championship which begins Monday at the Hiwan Golf Club.

After consultation with rules committee chairman Roger Dougherty, Janzen said players will be allowed to improve their lies in their own fairways during the qualifying and match play portion of the tournament.

"Two inches of rain have helped playing conditions at Hiwan," Janzen said Saturday night, "but because the course is less than a year old we felt the ruling was necessary and fair."

The ruling allows the players to improve the lie in the fairway with the club head within one club length of the ball but no nearer the hole.

Hiwan's greens and tees are in excellent condition, but the fairways have not filled in completely and the ruling was made to make playing conditions fair for all competitors.

Veteran amateurs throughout Colorado will be out to end the youth movement that has taken a brief but firm hold on tournament prestige in recent years.

Last year Larry McAtee of the Lakewood Country Club de-

feated Bob Douma in an all-collegiate finale at the Valley Country Club. McAtee was a sophomore at the University of Colorado and Douma the No. 1 man at Colorado State University.

McAtee, now 20, will be back to defend his title but by no means represents all the best of the young players who have taken over the golf scene.

Fowler, Dr. Sam Valuck, H. B. (Buzz) Bolas, Norm Smith, Jim English, Ron Moore, Spike Baker and Claude Wright represent the heady vets given a good chance next week.
