Larry 'Really Enjoys' 3rd Title

No one minded a bit when Larry McAtee drove a golf cart up to the awards table to collect the Colorado State match-play tournament trophy Sunday.

If anyone deserved a ride, it was the 22-year-old University of Colorado student who had just scored his third straight victory in this event.

He joined Hale Irwin of Boulder, who will be his teammate on the CU golf team next spring, in the three-time category. Irwin won the state medal championship for the third

straight year last June.

"I was really emotional about winning this tournament a year ago," McAtee said in his acceptance speech, "but this year I'm really enjoying it."

He then told of the magical qualities of his caddie, 13-year-old Mike Ryall, who has carried McAtee's bag in every one of the 18 straight match-play victories which led to his triple crown.

"I'll tell you," he grinned, "you just don't lose with Mike working for you." When some-

one asked Mike when he felt McAtee had his 1-up victory over Jim English Sr. tucked away Sunday, Mike's terse reply was "On the first tee."

McAtee defeated Bob Douma 3 and 2 in the 1963 finals of this tournament at the Valley Country Club to begin his streak. He also topped English 3 and 2 in the semifinals that same year. Last year he downed the CU golf coach, Les Fowler, 1-up on the 37th in a dramatic finish at the Hiwan Golf Club.

What did McAtee feel about

the pressure on him to win his third trophy this year?

"Well," he smiled, "I figured I'd play each match one at a time and if I could stay right at par golf I'd be in pretty good shape."

McAtee had rounds of 35-36-71 and 35-35-70 over the 35-36-71 Green Gables Country Club Sunday. In his semifinal win over Ron Moore of the Cherry Hills Country Club Saturday he was even with par when the match ended on the 16th.
