Irwin Pockets Match Medal

BOULDER — Hale Irwin continued to pad his golf credentials for the 1966 season Monday by grabbing medalist honors in the Colorado State Men's match play golf championship with a three-under-par 35-68 on the Boulder Country Club course.

Irwin, the Big Eight Conference golf champion and all-Big Eight safetyman of the Univer-

city of Colorado football team, had four birdies and a single bogey on his medalist card.

Match play got underway Tuesday, with Irwin drawing Gary Baxstrom of Denver at the head of the bottom bracket.

Irwin's teammate on the CU golf team last spring, Larry McAtee, is defending champion. He was to play Pete Demis of Denver, who qualified with a 78 in his first round match.

McAtee, a June CU graduate from the Lakewood Country Club, is seeking an unprecedented fourth straight Colorado match play title.

Another CU golfer, Gary Polumbus of the Cherry Hills Country Club, and Tom Reed of Broomfield, were a stroke behind Irwin with two-under-par 68s. The only other player to break par was a former CU

athlete, Larry Anderson of Greeley with a 70.

O. W. (Red) Nelson and Doug Kirkland, both of Rolling Hills Country Club, paced the senior flight qualifying with identical 72s. Neil Brown, defending seniors champion from the Columbine Country Club, was next with a 73.

Irwin, the area's low qualifier for the U.S. Open, turned the front nine in even par, with a bogey on the fourth, where he three-putted for a five, and a birdie on the eighth, where he drilled a 30-footer for his three.

Irwin showed his over-all power on the first three holes of the back nine, where he birdied the 10th, 11th and 12th to account for his three-under status.

Match play continues through Sunday, with a 36-hole pairing scheduled for the championship flight finalists.

BOULDER — Hale Irwin, a senior at the University of Colorado, fired a two-under-par on his home Boulder Country Club course Sunday to end teammate Larry McAtee's bid for a record fourth straight Colorado state match play golf title.

Irwin capitalized on a weak McAtee start in the morning round and used a crippling
