# Colorado Cup Match Ends in Tie

It ended in a morass of missed shots and a moral victory for the doughty amateur team captained by Les Fowler, the unpaid University of Colorado varsity golf

The Colorado Cup matches went down to the final four-ball pairing and to a 20-inch putt that Bob Hold, Paradise Valley Country Club pro, failed to connect on Sunday at the Lakewood Country Club.

"I just didn't have a solid grip on it when I went at it," Hold said.

The result was a team deadlock between Hold and Al Artach against amateurs Dave Schey and Kirk Padgett, the latter just missing a 15-foot chip shot that would have won the hole and saved Hold his embarrassment.

Or, the professional team, which was guided by veteran Fred Wampler of the Denver Country Club, could recount a number of incidents which led to the stalemate which must go into the book as a moral victory for the amateurs.

Wampler took himself out of the 17th hole in the afternoon best-ball matches by

# Inducts

COOPERSTOWN, N.Y. -(UPI) -Ralph Kiner, a seven-time National League home-run king during the 1940s and 1950s, was inducted into baseball's Hall of Fame Monday along with four other famous personalities of the past.

Joining the former Pittsburgh Pirate slugger in the shrine were Earl Averill and Billy Herman, two stars of the 1930s and 1940s; Bucky Harris, baseball's original "boy wonder" manager, and Judy Johnson, whose feats are lost in the mists of the old Negro Leagues but survive in the memories of his peers.

The 74-year-old Johnson almost stole the show. He won repeated ovations from the crowd when tears rolled down his cheeks and he had all he could do to continue speaking during the acknowledgment ceremony.

The induction ceremonles, presided over by Commissioner Bowie Kuhn, were held on the porch of the National Baseball Library. They were to be followed by a game between the Boston Red Sox and the San Francisco Giants.

Kiner, now a television commentator for the New York Mets, was one of the greatest sluggers of his era. A 6-foot-2, 200-pound righthanded batter, Kiner led the National League in homers in his first seven seasons and wound up with a career total of 369 for 10 major-league seasons.

Kiner, who was his league's home-run champion more times than any other player except Babe Ruth, hit 23 homers in his rookie season (1946) with the Pirates and followed with consecutive totals of 51, 40, 54, 47, 42 and 37.

Averill, 72, compiled a lifetime .318 batting average wih the Indians, Detroit Tigers and Boston Braves from 1929 through 1941 with a high of .378 in 1936. Herman, 66, had a .304 average for the
