Broadmoor Medalists Fire 68s

COLORADO SPRINGS — Defending champion Kris Monaghan of Albuquerque, N.M., and Lucille Ray of Rockhill, S.C., tied for medalist honors with 2-under-par 68s Friday in qualifying play for the 40th annual Broadmoor Ladies Invitational golf tournament on the 5,726-yard Broadmoor South course.

The top 64 qualifiers in the 148-woman field — following a playoff for the final position at 80 — advanced to match play starting at 8 a.m. today. Colorado players Tish Preuss, Colorado Springs, and Carol Flenniken, Brush, were in the top 10 Friday with 2-over-par 72 scores.

Trailing the leaders at 69 was University of Tulsa standout Barbara Thomas, Sibley, Iowa. Shooting 70s were two-time USGA amateur champion Juli Inkster, Los Altos, and Carol Gowan, Greenville, S.C. Sharing the 72 plateau with the Coloradans were Kathy Boker, Clover, S.C.; Loretta Aderete, Rancho Mirage, Calif., and Debbie Wright, Albuquerque.

The tournament winds up Wednesday with a 36-hole championship round. The Broadmoor South course is the site for the USGA Women's Amateur Championship in August.

Mother Sees Driver Son Killed

GARDENA, Calif. — Mary Templeton came to Southern California to attend the wedding of her son. She returned to Seattle for his burial.

Clark Templeton, a race car driver from Thousand Oaks, Calif., died last Saturday night in a crash at Ascot Park attempting to qualify for a sprint car main event.

Mrs. Templeton was at the track. The scene was reminiscent of 20 years ago.

On Aug. 23, 1962, Clark "Shorty" Templeton, her husband, died in a six-car crash in a midget race at Marion, Ohio.

Going into last week's race at Ascot, he was fifth in the CRA. That was the week before he was to marry Lark Turley. He was the only driver on the track when his car flipped. He died of massive head injuries just as his father had 20 years before.

Funeral services for Templeton were held on Wednesday with the burial scheduled in Seattle.

AMATEUR GOLF

Former POWs Had Ball, But Battles Raged in CGA

COLORADO SPRINGS — American Prisoners of War, conventioning in the shadow of Pikes Peak, played a little golf tournament Thursday afternoon at the Country Club of Colorado and had a ball.

But in a bigger tournament, assorted detractors who sought to capture Rick Cramer in the Colorado Golf Association's state stroke-play championship couldn't pull within telescopic sight of the University of Colorado senior who started and ended the chase with a five-shot lead.

Cramer hovered right at par throughout the final round of the 72-hole marathon tournament, tripped over a couple of so-called bogeys at 12 and 15, and then birdied two of the last three holes for

a level par 37-34-71 and a winning total of 83.

Pumsters included teammate Steve Ivan of Pueblo, who returns next fall to CU where he hopes to assume Cramer's No. 1 spot on coach Mark Simpkins's golf squad. But as Ivan discovered Thursday, par on the CC of Colorado layout is very commendable score.

Ivan 36-33 got him within three pops of Cramer through the 15th hole, but Cramer's 12-footer at 18 and 17-footer at 18, shut off any upstart notions the CU underclassman had. Ivan was lone runner-up at 88.

Cramer knows the feeling. He has been there where Ivan finished Thursday. The serious Cramer who is 21 going on 30, has played in the shadow of Steve Jones and Terry Kahl for three years. With Jones and Kahl now professionals, this

was Cramer's time to cash in.

And, the hunt goes on. "Well, it was kind of tough playing behind both Terry and Jones. They always seem to be there, just ahead of me," he said of Kahl's winning the state match-play championship and Jones the state match-play titles the past two years. Kahl, now an assistant pro at the Denver Country Club, won the individual title in the Big Eight Conference and Jones was low amateur in last year's Colorado Open, losing the championship in a sud-

den-death playoff with Dave Hill.

"I'd just start working harder," Cramer, who won both the state stroke- and match-play championships as a junior in 1977, said.

Cramer had the tournament's best score at the CC of Colorado, shooting a one-under-par 70 there the second day. His first round was a 71 at the Broadmoor Golf Club's west course and he finished 71-71 at the CC of Colorado.

Cramer is known as "Doctor Dart" by teammates who admire his ability to keep his tee shots

from wavering.

"I made myself stay out of trouble," he said.

The top 16 players off the stroke-play scoreboard will play two

rounds today in the match-play division of the tournament at Broadmoor West. After Saturday's semifinals there will be a 36-hole final Sunday.

Caddie Edits His Clubbing

COLORADO SPRINGS — The editor of the Harrison High School newspaper wasn't very objective.

"I help him with club selection quite a lot," Mike Donnelly, 17, said Friday as he sat resting just behind the 18th green of the Broadmoor Golf Club's West course.

"In my job here I can't be objective. We'll just try to win and if he keeps playing like he did today we'll be in good shape."

Donnelly is also one of the best caddies at the Broadmoor, and he is working for Mickey Brethower of Evergreen, a senior-to-be at the University of Arkansas.

Brethower battled his way through two opponents Friday, defeating Paul Brown 1 up in 20 holes in the morning action and Barry Jennings 2 up in the afternoon.

All this hard work put him up against Rick Cramer, the University of Colorado June graduate from Fort Collins, in today's semifinal action of the state's amateur match-play championship.

Donnelly, who sported a black left eye he earned in a neighborhood basketball game, agrees with his boss that Cramer, who Thursday won the stroke-play division of the tournament, is the man to beat.

Most of Friday's action was keyed around the West course greens which are slick and fast and take some getting to know after playing the Country Club of Colorado where three of the four stroke-play rounds took place.

Donnelly proved a crucial find for Brethower.

"We look at all the putts and how they break," Donnelly said. "What he really wants is the assurance that he is right."

Cramer admitted that he had to struggle getting by state junior match-play champion Doug Bakke of the Cherry Hills Country Club.

"He was only as tough as I made him," Cramer said of his 1-up win on the first extra hole. "I dinked it around a lot at the start and three-putted the fourth through the seventh holes. All those bogeys and I'm only one down."

"But the morning round set me up and I putted much better this afternoon," he said of his comparatively easy 3-and-4 win over Jim Empey of Colorado Springs, who plays for the University of Southern California.

In other action today, Craig Carson, the oldest survivor at 28 of 170 who started this marathon struggle last Monday, will play Kent Moore of the Lakewood Country Club and the second oldest player at 28.

Carson, a reinstated amateur who played professional golf in Europe and Australia, defeated CU junior Steve Ivan of Pueblo 1-up on the 21st in the first round and then took out Rick DeWitt of the Indian Tree Golf Club, 2 and 1.

"Obviously I didn't win much money on the tour or I'd still be out there," Carson said. He requested the United States Golf Association to restore his amateur status in 1979 and the USGA gave him the maximum 3-year probation. This is his first amateur tournament since that reinstatement came through three months ago.

Moore, who won the Colorado junior match play title in 1973, eliminated Jack Manzi 4 and 2 in the morning and Tom McGraw 2 and 1 in the afternoon.

Denver's Wellshire Golf Club, William Wright of Seattle became the first black to win a national golf championship when he won the Publinks.

He was 23 and a student at Western Washington University. He was also looking at several weeks training with his Army reserve unit.

Wright defeated former professional Frank Campbell of Jacksonville, Fla., 3 and 2, in the 36-hole final. Wright earned his trip into the finals by defeating the 1967 Publinks champion, Don East III of LSU, in the semifinals.

At that time Louisiana had a law forbidding competition between its all-black and all-white schools. East, who grew up in Indianapolis, said he did not agree with Louisiana's policies and was entered in the tournament as an individual.

"I was thinking of all the guys being nice to me," Wright said, "but I found East and Campbell very kind to me."

On July 19, 1969, still flush with victory, Wright brought out a telegram he had received from Bellingham, Wash.

"It's from my whole school," he said, "even the professors. And, knowing my grades, that's something." Wright expressed his desire to teach school and went on to win the NAIA championship in 1969, his senior year.

Today Wright owns the Los Sells rent-a-car agency in Glendale, Calif., and retains a certain bitterness about golf.

He is doing what he likes to do best, play professional golf.

Woodard might be a throwback to the early days of the tour, when most of the players came up through the caddy ranks.

Black golfers do not find many sponsors willing to provide posh country club settings for their development.

Woodard spent 10 years working at City Park Golf Club in Denver.

Maceo Rutherford, a retired postal clerk now living at Windsor Gardens, put together a golf program strictly for underprivileged children at City Park. He loved the game. He badgered everyone for old clubs, golf balls and other equipment, and he put the minority kids who wanted to play golf working on repairing the sticks.

He also persuaded the Denver Parks and Recreation Department to cooperate.

"That program was so unique," Woodard said. "I've played a lot of cities and in only one, Atlanta, did I find a program anywhere as strong as the one Mr. Rutherford put together at City Park."

"I went on to get my PGA card and played the tour off and on from 1964 through 1977. I just made enough to break even," he said. "I'd drop off the tour and teach. I spent eight years in the Los Angeles school system off and on through those years."

"I never had a sponsor and it was still a little too early as far as the racial thing was concerned. I'm 46 now and I still like golf. I just missed qualifying for the U.S. Open by a shot a couple of years ago."

A friend of Wright's, a golf official in Seattle who wished to re-

main anonymous, said Wright came home from Denver and felt he should have gotten more out of his Publinks victory.

"There was some bitterness. For instance, I think he felt he would get a big sponsor to help him on the tour. But I'll be frank, even here we were still having trouble when blacks entered tournaments."

(Denver had similar problems during the late 1960s and Wright's victory at Wellshire helped break down racial barriers.)

"I came home from Denver,

finished school and then started to save in order to pay my own way on 'the tour,'" Wright said.

"I went out with \$2,500 in my pocket. That lasted me for four years. I have no excuses, but I did get involved with a kind of a sponsor, a known gambler, and it was a tough situation."

"His name is Mose Stevens and the Los Angeles Times identified him as being in real estate. But he sponsored a lot of blacks, including Lee Elder and Curtis Sifford. He even helped Charlie Sifford."

"People know this, but they

don't know it. You know, the IRS and everything. There's never a record of anything. There were a lot of drawbacks. Mose wanted everything on his terms and you were always afraid of the image."

"He's helped Calvin Peete, but they eventually come to him and say they don't want to take his money anymore. I did that."

"I found a business partner and we opened up a Ford agency. We had the largest car rental fleet in California. My partner and I split and I started up the business I have now."

for five bucks. That's the hardest thing about getting started in golf, the expense of the game.

"I grew up with the program. He persuaded me to try out for the golf team and to apply for the Evans-Eisenhower caddy scholarship at the University of Colorado."

"Hey, I worked. I shagged balls. I caddied. I carried out the trash. I saw five concession contracts signed while I worked there."

Woodard played four years of varsity golf at CU and then tried the tour.

He recently lost a sponsor who had been with him for 4½ years. "That did happen back in February," Woodard said. "But since then I've gotten another one. Once I got my card my weekly expenses went up to \$1,000 a week and my first sponsor couldn't handle that."

Woodard, who graduated from Manual High School, finished college in 1978 and turned pro the following year.

"Well, it took me five times, or 2½ years, but I finally made it."

Woodard, now 27, said others interested in golf should consider the route he took.

Cramer, Moore to Meet for State Match-Play Title

COLORADO SPRINGS — Rick Cramer knows the value of a buck. He knows where the nickles and dimes go. He realizes there are uses for pennies other than as a ball mark on the green.

Cramer is in pursuit of two goals, a degree in economics from the University of Colorado and the state amateur match-play championship.

Economy is the key to his success. He shot the fewest numbers earlier this week in winning the stroke-play championship and Saturday he moved into the 36-hole final pairing by budgeting his golf game in a 2 and 1 victory over Mick Brethower of Evergreen in semifinal action over the Broadmoor Golf Club's West course.

He will meet Kent Moore, 28, of the Lakewood Country Club, who downed Craig Carson of the Heather Ridge Country Club, 5 and 4. Cramer and Moore will wind up the Colorado Golf Association's marathon week today.

Cramer has never been beyond the quarterfinals of

the Colorado state match-play championship and he is spending his opportunities wisely.

Brethower, a student at the University of Arkansas, lost the first two holes to Cramer's par-birdie start and was behind the rest of the way. He cut the margin to one with a par win on the fifth and both made the turn in par 36.

Cramer then won 10 with a birdie and the 11th with a par when Brethower drove carelessly and wound up in the water.

"That was the turning point," Brethower said of the start on the back nine. "When I hit it in the trees on the 10th and had to come back to the fairway I knew I was in trouble. That's a bad hole and that's where I lost my momentum. Hitting in the water on 11 didn't help, either."

Cramer's consistency off the tee (his University of Colorado teammates call him "Doctor Dart") kept the pressure on the more erratic Brethower, but the Broadmoor golfer made several remarkable putts and scrambled to keep Cramer from pulling too far out in front.

Cramer's approach shot on the 14th was dead to

the pin but hit the top of a water sprinkler and bounded out the back door of the green. His chip back was too strong and he bogeyed. Brethower's two-putt par cut the deficit to only two.

They halved the 15th, and Brethower was running out of holes. He was 2 down with three to go. Time to make a move. But his 15-foot putt on the par-3 17th that would have put the squeeze on Cramer never was on line to the hole.

"That one confused me. My caddy and I read it a straight putt and it broke off right as soon as I hit it." That wasn't the only putt that figured prominently in his defeat.

On the dogleg 17th, Cramer drove through the fairway and had to get the ball up quickly from behind a group of tall pines. He carried off the shot but was 21 feet past the hole. Brethower, who came down the adjacent No. 3 fairway, put his second shot eight feet from the pin.

It looked like the match would continue on to the 18th when Cramer's first putt died six feet from the cup. But Brethower's birdie putt stayed on the right lip and refused to break away from the mountain.

"We both agreed on the right lip," Brethower said of consulting his caddy, 17-year-old Mike Donnelly, "but it stayed on the right lip. I couldn't hit a better putt."

At this point in the match Cramer began to think of time-saving measures.

He didn't want to go to the 18th tee box.

"When I stood over the 21-footer I said, 'Just get it close around the hole.' All I wanted was to two-putt and force him to make the birdie putt to beat time. Then he missed."

"I said, 'I can make this six-footer and go home. I can put him away. Go to work.' I picked the line, got over it and stroked it. Was I ever happy when it went in."

"He is a tough competitor and I got exactly what I expected," Cramer said. "I knew that regardless of what happened he would stay right in there. I don't pay attention to anyone else when I play. I just think about my own game."

"Pressure? Yeah, people say the pressure is on me to win both titles, but I have things going for me. I'm playing well and that puts me on the plus side."

Weary Cramer Completes State Double

COLORADO SPRINGS — They came out of the corner swinging like a pair of punched-out fighters and when the final bell sounded at the end of 34 holes Sunday, Rick Cramer had a 3 and 2 decision over Kent Moore in the match-play division of the State Amateur golf championship marathon.

In the case of Cramer it was stubborn tenacity as the physically and mentally fatigued finalists went at it head-to-head over the undulating hills and vexing greens of the Broadmoor Golf Club's West course.

Moore went into the battle prepared to keep Cramer from a sweep of the state's top amateur titles. His most damaging weapons all week had been a strong and well-timed putting stroke.

Cramer won the 72-hole stroke-play title through Thursday with consistently accurate tee shots, a penchant for not missing greens and a compatible putting game.

But after two rounds of match play Friday, and a welcomed semifinal session Saturday, neither competitor had complete confidence in his game.

Moore three-putted more greens in the morning round than he had all week but was only 2 down to Cramer whose accuracy with his approach shots suddenly deserted him. He finished the day visiting more sand traps than he had seen all week.

And, like two battered and bruised heavyweights, each had opportunities to put the other away but didn't have the strength to lift the gloves.

Cramer was more aggressive. He had more to win. Only two other amateurs have won both the stroke- and match-play

titles in one season, Chris Norriling in 1973 and Gary Lennell in 1974.

Cramer, No. 1 on the University of Colorado golf team last season, had another vested interest in the two titles. As a prepster at Poudre High School in 1977 he won the same honors in the junior division.

Following the noon recess, Moore's erratic putting led to some spectacular saves and some untimely misses. Other parts of his game suffered and when he put it in the bank on the front of the ninth green (27th hole), the ball spun back down hill and into the water.

Cramer, who proved more of a survivor, pushed his lead to 4 up at that point, winning three holes in a row.

But just as it appeared he would waste in and deliver the knockout blow, he staggered on the par-5 10th where Moore came out of the trees to salvage a one-putt par. Cramer was behind the pin in 3 and looking at a possible 5-up advantage but three-putted for a loss instead.

Both one-putted for a halve on the par-3 11th. Cramer saved par from off the green at 12 but missed from 36 inches at the 13th for a possible win. Cramer's drive on that 353-yard downhill was only 12 yards from the front edge of the green.

Moore came off the deck for a good par at the 14th to cut the deficit to 2 down as Cramer's 18 footer to halve rimmed out.

Neither player could rekindle the momentum that brought them to the finals. Cramer regained a hint of it when he put a wedge five feet from the pin on the 15th to go back to 3 up with his birdie there. It was over on the next hole where Moore found the sand, failed to get down in two, and Cramer cooed a long lag putt inside gimme range.

total was 268, 12 strokes below par over the soggy Oakwood Country Club course.

"I knew 63 would get me a tie for lead so I didn't rule myself out. I felt good when I came to the course," said Stewart, two shots behind the leaders after 54 holes.

The winner of less than \$14,000 in his 1981 rookie season, Stewart, who wore purple knickers Sunday, took home \$36,000.

His biggest pro paycheck pushed his seasonal bankroll past \$74,000 and earned the second-year tourist spots in the PGA, Masters and Tournament of Champions.

LPGA — Sally Little shot a final round 4-un-

der-par 68 to defeat a hard-charging Beth Daniel by five strokes in winning the \$200,000 Ladies Professional Golf Association Mayflower Classic in Indianapolis and dedicated the victory to an ill long-time friend.

"This win is very important to me," said Little, who had only 22 putts. "I have a friend of mine that's not doing very well. She's very ill, actually. And I dedicated this tournament to her."

Little identified the friend as Glenda Cannon of Dallas and said the woman had been an avid supporter of her since early in her career.

The victory was worth \$30,000 to Little.
